

A Living Hope in the midst of difficult and uncertain times

We are once again in the midst of turmoil with the pandemic. For many it has been a very difficult Christmas, for others it has been lovely to meet with a handful of extra people over Christmas. However we have spent Christmas, we are all concerned about the health of Britain – and of Wales in particular as we start this new year. Our hope for positive outcomes this next year is up and down. As the vaccines start to be deployed we are hopeful that there might be a lift in the prospects of all – particularly the most vulnerable. Yet we also hear of rising levels of coronavirus and worrying new strains. We pray that God would help us to deploy these vaccines. We pray that we would be able to provide adequate medical care and care for the mental health of the vulnerable people in our nation and in other nations too.

This inheritance is kept in heaven for you, ⁵ who through faith are shielded by God's power until the coming of the salvation that is ready to be revealed in the last time. ⁶ In all this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while you may have had to suffer grief in all kinds of trials. ⁷ These have come so that the proven genuineness of your faith – of

What's in a name?

Here's a little bit extra that didn't fit into our Focus article this month (see final page).

If you've ever been to New Park Street English Baptist Chapel, Holyhead, you may have noticed that it isn't actually on New Park Street (it's on Newry Street). Furthermore, there isn't even a New Park Street in Holyhead.

There is a Park Street (and an Upper Park Street and Lower Park Street). Was the church formerly located there before moving to new premises, much as Penrallt took our name when we moved from Penrallt Isaf to Holyhead Road?

Good guess, but no! It is actually named after New Park Street Chapel in London, where renowned preacher C. H. Spurgeon was the pastor (before they moved to bigger premises and became the Metropolitan Tabernacle) and is so named in honour of the fact that Spurgeon himself laid the foundation stone for the chapel building in Holyhead in 1860.

Ochildren's Work

Home Mission

Supporting Baptist ministries across the UK

Home Mission exists to help Baptist churches across Britain to share God's love with their communities. Of all Home Mission projects, the closest to home for us is New Park Street English Baptist Chapel in Holyhead. Their minister, Deb Stammers, was a church member at Penrallt until she moved to Holyhead to start a placement two years ago as part of her ministerial training, which finished earlier this year.

Deb actually has a dual role. New Park Street, like Penrallt, falls under the auspices of the North Western Baptist Association (NWBA) within the Baptist Union of Great Britain (BUGB). Deb's work there is partially supported by a BUGB Home Mission grant. Since this autumn, she is also a *Gweinidog Cenhadol* ("Missions Minister"), working with the Baptist Union of Wales (BUW) in Welsh-language chapels across Anglesey and supported partly by the BUW Home Mission fund. Deb is still finding her feet with the BUW job – a process made significantly more difficult by the covid restrictions.

Unsurprisingly, the work in Holyhead is largely online at the moment, with services live on Facebook on Sunday mornings and midweek groups on Zoom and Facebook. Plans to go back to the building have been temporarily disrupted by lockdown. Nonetheless a large part of the work involves encouraging and equipping the congregation to get rooted in their community and reach out to the people around them. They have an estimated 500 front doors within a 5 minute walk of their congregation (who, by and large, live a lot closer to one another than Penrallt's).

Please pray:

- For peace, clarity and an effective ministry to the local community in times of great uncertainty, with covid and the as-yet largely unknown effects of Brexit on Holyhead.
- That those who have joined online activities will make the transition as face-to-face activities are resumed (but give thanks that they have seen growth in the church community as a result of the forced move online).
- For growth in the work with children and families, and a more missional outlook for the church as well as greater participation in services.
- For Deb as she balances her BUGB and BUW roles.
- Give thanks for the provision of a lovely house for Deb and the family a spacious vicarage in Holyhead rented from the Church in Wales.
